On the second last day, we went to the National Capital Exhibition Centre and the National Capital Museum which was very interesting. We also enjoyed the view from Black Mountain Tower and had a very 'warm experience' at the National Film and Sound Archive!

On the last night, a majority of us visited the Australian Institute of Sport while a few remained at the cabins to catch up on some rest.

It was a very busy excursion with lots to see and do and we had a fabulous time visiting our Nation's Capital!

Thank you to Mrs Pincham, Mr Adam, Mrs Watton, Miss Kuras and our bus driver, Mr McWhirter, for organising and supervising the excursion.







Awesome Dad Tip 9: AFFIRM YOUR CHILD





... an excerpt from 'Fathers Who Dare Win' by Ian Grant

- * Positively label your children whenever possible so that they see themselves as a helpful, honest, reliable or loving person. The labels the people around us attach to us tend to stick!
- * However, when praising your child ask yourself, what is the underlying message behind your praise? Make sure that you are reinforcing something that your child can do something about, ie, not, 'You look nice' but, 'I like the way you dressed yourself and brushed your hair'.
- * Understand that if you affirm (or console) your child when they come home from school with poor grades on a report, you're not saying it's okay or that you don't expect more, you're simply acknowledging your disappointment and affirming that you expect them to do better next time and know they can.
- * Only measure their improvement against themselves, not their friends or siblings, and be sure to praise and affirm their improvements.



Facebook

The use of social networking sites is prevalent in our lives. It is a relatively new form of communication and needs to be used carefully. It is recommended that children under the age of 12 shouldn't engage in this communication, however, here are some **Facebook Safety Guidelines** as suggested by *Ian Grant* from the book 'Fathers Who Dare Win', for monitoring and protecting children on social networking sites.

- Know the password and have access to your child's page.
- 2. Customise your child's settings to make the profile safer, ie, privacy, visibility, etc.
- Emails of posts, friends, etc, should also come to the family's home email.
- 4. Parents will have an account on Facebook and children must add and keep parents as 'friends'.
- Children will not add strangers as friends, nor should they use the Facebook 'chat' applications to talk to strangers.
- Parents will set a limit on time that children are allowed on Facebook.
- The computer will be kept in a common area of the house, such as a living room or play room, where it
 will always be in easy view.
- 8. Children should **not share personal information** (address, phone number, pictures, etc), with anyone on Facebook that they do not know well.
- 9. Children should **immediately tell their parents if they see anything or talk to anyone on Facebook that makes them uncomfortable**. Parents should take immediate action to block or report that material.
- If the child breaks any of the set guidelines, his or her account should be deleted and a probation period will begin until they re-earn their parents' trust.



ZIP IT

Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online.



BLOCK IT

Block people who send nasty messages and don't open unknown links and attachments.



FLAG IT

Flag up with someone you trust if anything upsets you or if someone asks to meet you offline.

You must make important decisions before the fire season starts


You are at risk from bush fires if you live or work near bushland, grassland, scrub, or farmland.

A fire can be terrifying, with strong winds, intense heat and flames, and thick smoke. Don't make rushed and dangerous decisions. Prepare your Bush Fire Survival Plan. Relocate aged, young and sick family members early from areas likely to be impacted by fires. Leaving early is the safest option.

Your well-prepared home will increase the safety of fire fighters and is more likely to survive a bush fire even if you leave early.

ACT

The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions



Know the fire danger in your area and what it means. The fire danger rating should be your first trigger for action and could save your life. When the rating is Catastrophic, leaving early is the only option for your survival.

Know your triggers. Be prepared to activate your Bush Fire Survival Plan with little or no warning.



Assess your bush fire risk and find your Bush Fire Survival Plan, Fire Danger Ratings, Bush Fire Alerts and Neighbourhood Safer Places at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

Fires may threaten without warning so you need to know what you will do to survive

Know your bush fire alerts.

Advice means a fire is nearby and you should stay up to date.

At Watch and Act, a bush fire is approaching and you need to put your Bush Fire Survival Plan into action.

An Emergency Warning means you may be in danger. Don't wait for direction from emergency services, as failure to act can result in death or injury.

If you plan to leave early, you should leave long before the bush fire is in your area.

Do not stay and defend without careful planning and preparation.

Know an alternative route to a safer location. Find out if there is a Neighbourhood Safer Place in your area, but remember they should only be used as a place of last resort.

Have a back-up plan in case you can't get to a safer location.
